


Research Guide for UBC Library







You can limit your results to a library, year, author, subject area, etc.

FIND AN ARTICLE in UBC Libraries

REMEMBER: You are always looking for Scholarly (Peer Reviewed) Journals!





Click on Database title.



Helpful research strategies

When you find an article or an e-book that you think you *might* use, save it to your desktop if you can! Do not assume you will be able to link back to it easily.

Have a word doc open as you search, and use the document to create your citation. The citation list will guarantee that you can find the source again, and that you won't miss citing anything.

Remember to CITE ALL your sources!!

Tips for Finding Sources for Your Paper

Use Advanced Search


Try different combinations of your key words.



Use FILTERS!

ALWAYS: FULL TEXT, SCHOLARLY / PEER REVIEWED / LANGUAGE

Then: consider date, subject, etc.



Tips for Searching Databases

AND, OR, NOT

These are used to connect and define relationships between your keywords.



Phrase and Wildcard searching

Quotation marks are used to search for an exact phrase in an exact order:

"Simple Recipe" will yield results on that exact phrase.

Wildcard searching * \$?

Used to search for a term and variant spellings of that term.

Colo*r / colo?r / colo\$r -- will return both color and colour

Brackets


Used to control the search sequence:

How does taking vitamins affect your health?

(vitamins OR supplements) AND health

UBC Library Research Guides

Go to UBC library homepage, and find the Get Research Help tab. Select Research Guides.



Choose a Research Area; ie: History, Psychology, English

Click **Articles** -- sometimes tab will say "databases" – because articles live in databases

Choose a database and Connect – green button (use CWL)

Search on your selected keywords

Use filters to get the number of hits down to less than 20 (date, language, etc)
